BIO:

Maria Giuseppina Strillacci is an Associate Professor at the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Animal Science (DIVAS) of the University of Milan. With a PhD in Animal Production and degrees in Animal Science and Veterinary Medicine, her expertise focuses on animal genetics applied to livestock improvement, with a particular emphasis on cattle, poultry, and companion animals. She is responsible for the molecular genetics lab and leads the bioinformatic analysis of her research group. Her current research focuses on the analysis of structural variants to identify genomic variation among breeds and their adaptation to changing environments.

She has gained solid academic and research experience, including a period as Honorary Associate/Fellow at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She has participated in numerous international and national research projects, collaborating with institutions in Mexico, Canada, Iran, and Israel. Her research interests include the evolution and biodiversity of animal breeds, gene expression analysis, the identification of candidate genes for hereditary diseases, and genomic structural variation. She is the author of over 69 publications in peer-review journals. She coordinates and participates in funded research projects, demonstrating leadership and skills in managing work groups. She possesses technical skills in both the laboratory (nucleic acid isolation, PCR, sequencing) and bioinformatic analysis (population genetics, sequence analysis, association analysis).

BIO:

Stefano Paolo Marelli is an Associate Professor at the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Animal Science (DIVAS) of the University of Milan with a PhD in Small Animal Production, including a period as visiting PhD student at the Scottish Agricultural College in Ayr Scotland, and a Master of Science degree in Animal Science. Stefano works on canine biodiversity and genetic since the nineties. His research topics are phenotyping and genotyping of canine and poultry breeds and population both under a morphological and behavioural point of view. His expertise is focused on ethnology, morphometrical analysis, behavioural characterization and welfare relate genes expression in small species. Stefano is author in more than 55 publications in peer reviewed indexed journals, he coordinates and participates in funded research projects. He is one of the founders of the VEtoGene (Veterinary for Ethology and Genetic) spin-off of the University of Milan. He is member of the Scientific Committee of ASPA and EAAP Companion Animals Commissions. He is Technical Consultant of ENCI (Ente Nazionale della Cinofilia Italiana) and member of the ENCI Scientific Committee and of the ENCI Central Technical Commission (ENCI, Academic Delegate, Ministry of Agriculture, Ministry of Health). Stefano is FCI judge for Jack Russell Terrier, Dachshunds and some herding breeds in group I, he is judge for CAE1 (good citizen dog) behavioural test.

IRISH WOLFHOUSES FROM 1900 TO THESE DAYS, INTERVIEW WITH MRS. NAGLE (SULHAMSTEAD) AND DEVELOPMENTS IN THE UK

Abstract:

Our breed has been very fortunate. Mrs Nagle who had been a pillar of the breed since 1912 was still with us into the 80's, so we had someone who was still active and able to give a perfect insight into the breed and changes through to the 80's. Her thoughts and fears for the breed should always be seen as valuable tools to help us in the future. Not many breeds are as fortunate. With this in mind has the breed changed for good or bad? In what way? Have we kept true to the standard? Is our breed still bred to be able to do the job it was meant for? We have been involved with the breed for 38 years. We were fortunate to be friends with people who were very close to Mrs Nagle. One in particular Sheila Kemp entrusted us with a 3hr interview she did with Mrs Nagle. The tapes were a valuable source for the book Mission Accomplished. I feel it would be useful to talk about whether some of her fears for the breed have come to pass.

Dogs have been a part of my life since birth and specifically showing and breeding purebred dogs has been a part of my life since I received a Collie pup when I was 12 years old. After successfully breeding and showing rough and smooth Collies for almost 40 years, life changes required me to take a break. During that “break” I met my husband-to-be, who showed Irish Wolfhounds. I was again “hooked” (not just on my new husband, but the Irish Wolfhound breed), and I joined him in this adventure under the name, Glenn Eyrie. Since the first litter in 2011, and with a small breeding program of one litter about every 2-3 years, we have bred and owned twenty champions with six more youngsters on their way towards championship.

As a person who believes in giving back, and has trouble saying no, I have been the secretary, webmaster, and subsequently the President of the Northern California Irish Wolfhound Club for multiple years. I have been on the Board of Directors of the Irish Wolfhound Club of America for four years, and I am currently the President. I am also the lead editor of a team that produces the quarterly IWCA publication, Harp & Hound.

On a personal level, in addition to being married to Jim, I have two grown daughters and one grandson. I retired 10 years ago from a career in education as a vice president of academics at a college in the Napa Valley, California. Bio:

In 1978 I acquired my first Irish Wolfhound that started me on my journey of learning about wolfhounds, sighthounds, and the dog world. The first Starkeeper litter was born in 1980. Since then, I have produced over 150 Irish Wolfhound show champions, obedience & rally titlists, lure coursing and racing champions in Canada, the USA, Italy, Russia and Australia. I am committed to breeding Irish Wolfhounds that are both typical examples of the breed and can perform in the field. As a judge I strive to recognize dogs that are functional. Given the amount of time I spent on the field, in my home and the show ring with sighthounds, I consider myself a sighthound specialist. In 2017 I became an all breed judge. My judging assignments since 2000 have literally taken me around the world. I have had the pleasure of going over some outstanding dogs in the course of my travels across Canada, the USA, Mexico, South America, United Kingdom, many countries in Europe, Russia, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. In 2015 I judged at the Westminster Kennel Club Show. The dog world has provided me with ample opportunities and positive experiences in my areas of interest: dogs, travel and meeting interesting people. In giving back to the sport that has so enriched my life, I have developed a form and function educational presentation on the Irish Wolfhound. I was a contributor to the current Illustrated Standards for Irish Wolfhounds sponsored by the Irish Wolfhound Club of America and the Federation of Irish Wolfhound Clubs in Europe. I was the co-creator and co-presenter of the AKC Webinar on the Irish Wolfhound delivered to judges in 2021.

After over 45 years I am still active in breeding and exhibiting Irish Wolfhounds and have had many successes in performance events, all breed and specialty rings with my hounds. So I know what it's like to be judged, as well as doing the judging.

It's exciting for me to find quality dogs in my ring. I am very much looking forward to my assignment at the World Dog Show in Italy in 2026 and feel honoured to be invited.

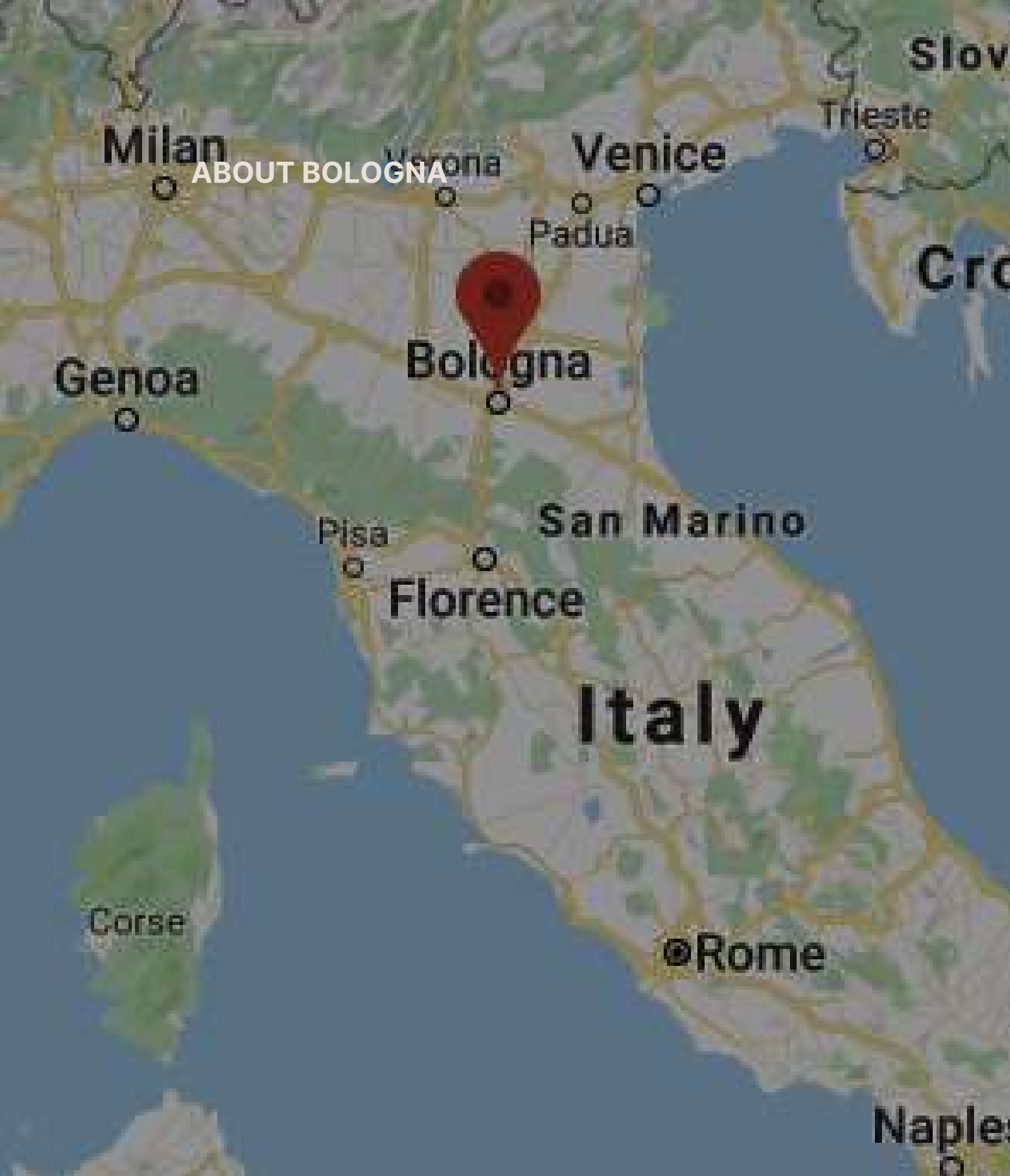
